



Evacuation of Children Overseas.		
Pupil Objectives	Activities	Pupil outcomes
<p>Children should:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Explore the different ways in which children were evacuated during the Second World War.2. Know that children were evacuated and the reasons for evacuation.3. Explore the feelings and experiences of some of those who were evacuated overseas.4. Use an appropriate range of resources including ICT to find out about evacuation overseas.5. Communicate their knowledge and understanding of evacuation overseas in a number of ways.	<p>Children could:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Identify the countries that evacuees were sent to. Explain why they were sent to these particular countries and how long it would have taken to get there.2. Compare the experiences of an overseas evacuee with one who stayed at home. Was it a better experience and who might have been there to support them?3. Invent a series of games that could be played on board ship. Include activities that might have added to the safety of the ship.4. Make a list of ideas to try and keep the ship as safe as possible from attack. Imagine a set of rules that the passengers would need to follow during an attack on the ship.5. Examine the photographic evidence of life on board the evacuation ships.6. Write/produce a postcard home describing the voyage. The postcard could have a picture of the ship on the front.7. Compare the holidays that people go on nowadays with the experiences of wartime overseas evacuees.8. Look at modern day methods of communication and how they might have affected the experiences of an overseas evacuee.	<p>Pupils should:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Describe the likely feelings and experiences of an overseas evacuee.2. Use evacuation words accurately and appropriately.3. Begin to select and combine information from different sources.4. Suggest why some evacuees were sent overseas and why the scheme was eventually stopped.5. Identify differences in the experiences of evacuees at home with those sent abroad.
